Objective

Students will conduct research on a career at a Marion business. The hope is that students will discover that their community has many career opportunities. This lesson may take several days to complete.

Standards

W.3.2 Write informative/explanatory texts to examine a topic and convey ideas and information clearly.

- Introduce a topic and group related information together; include illustrations to aid comprehension, if needed.
- Develop the topic with facts, definitions, and details.

Vocabulary:

Procedures:

- 1. Project the list of businesses that are part of Marion Made.
- 2. Give each student a copy of the Marion Careers Mini-Research Project Rubric questions.
- 3. Allow students time to choose a career to research.
- 4. Demonstrate and review for students how to do a Google search. Choose a local career not being researched by a student and model researching and answering the Marion Career Mini-Research Project questions.
- 5. Allow students time to research their chosen career and answer the Marion Careers Research Project questions.
- 6. Review the Marion Career Mini-Research Project Rubric with students.
- 7. Using the research that you modeled for students in step 4, model writing a short informational text about the topic.



8. Allow students time to write independently and work through the writing process (pre-writing, drafting, peer editing, drafting, and publishing).

Extension

Teachers may want students to create a visual aid for the project. Students could create a poster or a slide show. Teachers could also invite members of the community who have experience with careers that students researched to speak to the students about their careers.

Assessment

Students' completed informative text scored with rubric.
